A Word from Deacon Roger Filips

Trusting Christ in the Storm

As Elijah learned in the tiny whispering sound on the mountaintop, God often reveals Himself in ways we do not expect. The Lord frequently comes to us quietly, gently, and in a way our hearts can receive. In the Gospel story of Jesus walking on water, that same nearness appears in a more dramatic way: Christ walks to the disciples across the storm-tossed sea.

At first, they do not recognize Him. Fear makes Him seem like a ghost. But Jesus speaks: "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid." His words are more than comfort. He is revealing Himself as the Lord who is stronger than the storm.

Peter's response gives us a picture of faith that is both bold and fragile. He steps out of the boat because Jesus calls him. He begins to sink not because he has no faith, but because the wind distracts him and fear takes over. Yet even then, Peter teaches us one of the simplest and most powerful prayers: "Lord, save me." Jesus does not wait for Peter to have perfect faith before helping him. He reaches out immediately and catches him.

That is good news for us. Grief, illness, family struggles, financial worries, and fear can all feel like storms. At times, our suffering seems louder than the voice of Christ. But Jesus still comes to us. He still says, "Do not be afraid." He still calls us to trust Him, and when we begin to sink, He is close enough to catch us.

Faith does not mean we never feel afraid. Faith means we keep turning toward Jesus, especially when the storm makes Him hard to see. Like a child jumping into a father's arms even when he cannot see clearly, we trust because our Father sees us, calls us by name, and will not let us fall.

Pope John XXIII said every man has a right to necessary "medical care" (among other things) (Pacem in Terris 11), but "medical care" as understood by the Pope is not the same as "health care" as understood by modern society with free tooth cleanings, birth control, Viagra, and abortions. 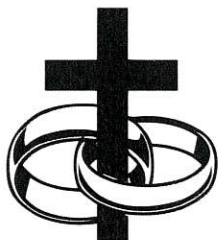

THE SEVEN SORROWS OF MARY: A GUIDE TO THE DEVOTION

The Origins of the Seven Sorrows Devotion

While the contemplation of Mary's grief dates back to the early Church Fathers, the formalized devotion to the Seven Sorrows—also known as the Seven Dolors—gained its liturgical structure through the Servite Order in the 13th century. However, it was St. Bridget of Sweden who elevated this practice to a global scale in the 14th century.

Through her mystical revelations, Our Lady issued a heart-wrenching lament: "I look around at all who are on earth, to see if by chance there are any who pity Me, and meditate upon My Sorrows; and I find that there are very few."

Our Lady explicitly requested that her children meditate daily on her seven specific "dolors," attaching seven magnificent promises to the recitation of seven Hail Marys. While the Church specifically honors this mystery during the month of September, it remains a powerful daily practice for those seeking to console the heart of Mary and draw closer to the Passion of her Son.

The Seven Promises to St. Bridget

Our Lady revealed to St. Bridget that she would grant seven specific graces to those who honor her daily by meditating on her tears and sorrows while praying seven Hail Marys.

Peace in the Home: I will grant peace to their families.

Divine Enlightenment: They will be enlightened about the divine mysteries.

Consolation in Pain: I will console them in their pains and I will accompany them in their work.

Answered Petitions: I will give them as much as they ask for as long as it does not oppose the adorable will of my divine Son.

Spiritual Defense: I will defend them in their spiritual battles and I will protect them at every instant of their lives.

A Holy Death: I will visibly help them at the moment of their death; they will see the face of their Mother.

Immediate Entry to Heaven: Those who propagate this devotion will be taken directly from this earthly life to eternal happiness, for all their sins will be forgiven.

The Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Virgin: Summary & Scripture

To practice this devotion, one meditates on each of the following seven events, typically followed by one Hail Mary for each.

1. The Prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:34–35)

As Mary presents the Infant Jesus in the Temple, the aged Simeon predicts that a sword of sorrow will pierce her soul. This is the "beginning of the end," where Mary's joy is forever joined to the shadow of the Cross.

2. The Flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13–14)

The Holy Family escapes in the night and travels to Egypt, fleeing the murderous intent of Herod. Mary experiences the sorrow of exile and the fear for her Child's life, and the knowledge of the death of the Holy Innocents.

3. The Loss of Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:43–45)

For three agonizing days, Mary and Joseph search for the young Jesus in Jerusalem. This represents the greatest interior pain: the perceived "loss" of God's presence.

4. Meeting Jesus on the Way to Calvary (Luke 23:26–27)

Mary watches her Son, beaten and disfigured, carrying the heavy wood of the Cross. Their eyes meet in a silent exchange of love and shared redemptive suffering.

5. Standing at the Foot of the Cross (John 19:25–27)

Mary endures the three-hour agony of her Son. She becomes the "Queen of Martyrs" not by shedding her blood, but by the "martyrdom of the heart."

6. Mary Receives the Dead Body of Jesus (John 19:38–40)

The Pietà. The Body of the Savior is placed in the arms of His Mother. She who once held Him as an infant now holds Him as the sacrificed Lamb.

7. The Burial of Jesus (John 19:41–42)

Mary watches as the stone is rolled across the entrance of the tomb. She enters into the "Great Silence," waiting in perfect trust for the Resurrection.

What a blessing and joy it is to be a seminararian representing the Archdiocese of Omaha! I am so incredibly excited to see where the Lord takes me and how many amazing people I will encounter.

I have always been a Nebraska "cradle Catholic" boy, having a home in Gretna. I love to run, play spikeball, and watch and play baseball and football (Go Big Red!). In the first grade, my family became parishioners at St. Patrick in Elkhorn. There, I would encounter the Lord in radical ways. I went to school there through eighth grade and was confirmed to the Church in 2018 by Archbishop Lucas. WHAT IS EVANGELIZATION?

Other Implications of Evangelization:

Evangelization, then, has both an inward and an outward direction. *Inwardly* it calls for our continued receiving of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, our ongoing conversion both individually and as Church. It nurtures us, makes us grow, and renews us in holiness as God's people. *Outwardly* evangelization addresses those who have not heard the Gospel or who, having heard it, have stopped practicing their faith, and those who seek the fullness of faith. It calls us to work for full communion among all who confess Jesus but do not yet realize the unity for which Christ prayed. Pope John Paul II, in his encyclical on missionary activity, summed up the three objectives of mission: to proclaim the Gospel to all people; to help bring about the reconversion of those who have received the Gospel but live it only nominally; and to deepen the Gospel in the lives of believers.

We know that the word "evangelization" sometimes raises uncomfortable images for Catholics—especially in the culture of the United States, where evangelism has sometimes meant only an individual response to enthusiastic preaching, a style of mass religion, a contrived way to recruit new members, or, at its worst, a way to play on people's needs. Still, we use the word "evangelization" because its root meaning is "Gospel" (Good News) and because it calls us, even if it is uncomfortable, to live the faith of our baptism more openly and to share it more freely.

We want to make it clear that evangelization means something special for us as Catholics. We can see what it means by looking at what happens to evangelized people. Not only are they related to Jesus by accepting his Gospel and receiving his Spirit; even more, their lives are changed by becoming disciples, that is, participants in the Church, celebrating God's love in worship and serving others as Jesus did.

Some might think of evangelization solely in terms of Jesus and our relationship with him. Yet our relationship with Jesus is found in our relationship with the community of Jesus—the Church. The way to Christ is through the community in which he lives. Did not Jesus say, "I am with you always" and "Whatever you did for one of these least [brothers and sisters of mine], you did for me"? Did not the Jesus who met Paul on the road to Damascus say that he lived in his persecuted followers, the Church? Jesus is present in and among his disciples, the People of God.

Evangelization, then, has different implications depending on our relationship to Jesus and his Church. For those of us who practice and live our Catholic faith, it is a call to ongoing growth and renewed conversion. For those who have accepted it only in name, it is a call to re-evangelization. For those who have stopped practicing their faith, it is a call to reconciliation. For children, it is a call to be formed into disciples through the family's faith life and religious education. For other Christians, it is an invitation to know the fullness of our message. For those who have no faith, it is a call to conversion to know Christ Jesus and thus experience a change to new life with Christ and his Church.

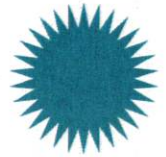

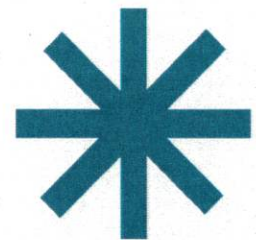
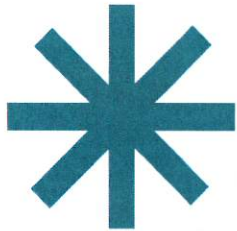

The first Labor Day holiday was celebrated on Tuesday, September 5, 1882, in New York City, in accordance with the plans of the Central Labor Union. The Central Labor Union held its second Labor Day holiday just a year later, on September 5, 1883. By 1894, 23 more states had adopted the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed a law making the first Monday in September of each year a national holiday. American labor has raised the nation's standard of living and contributed to the greatest production the world has ever known and the labor movement has brought us closer to the realization of our traditional ideals of economic and political democracy. It is appropriate, therefore, that the nation pays tribute on Labor Day to the creator of so much of the nation's strength, freedom, and leadership – the American worker.

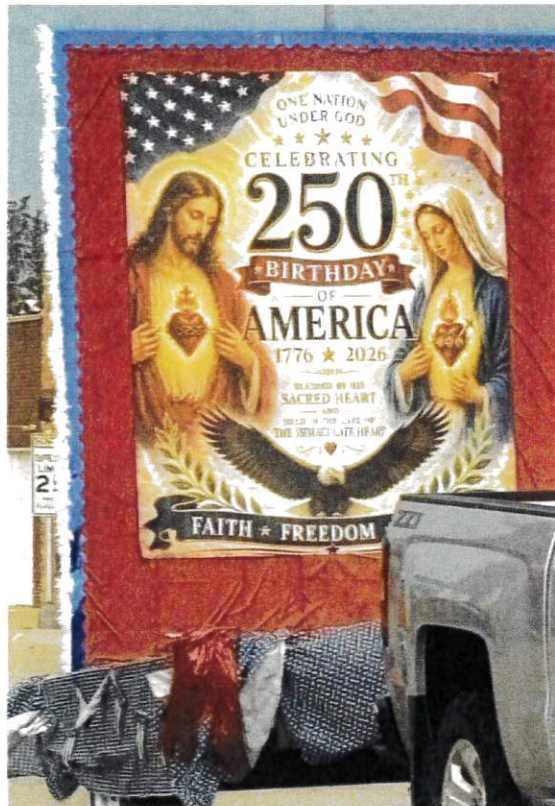

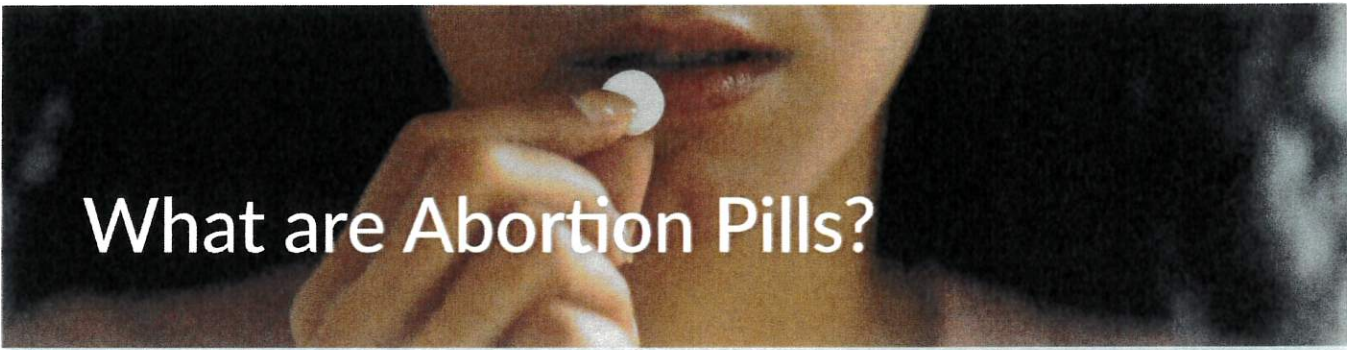

Abortion activists are pushing through legislation to codify a "right" to abortion in federal law. Their goal is to cancel every single state law protecting a preborn baby's right to life. They've already been successful in 9 states and the District of Columbia. Only thirteen have a total ban. Nebraska has a ban after 12 weeks, with limited exceptions. Twenty seven other states have some restrictions.

Unrestricted access to the abortion pill is allowing abortion rates to increase, which means we have to focus on changing hearts, not just laws.

What are Abortion Pills?

Most abortions are no longer done by surgery in clinics, but by taking pills.

The rate of women taking abortion pills is increasing (and is at hundreds of thousands per year).

The first pill (mifepristone) kills preborn babies by cutting them off from blood and oxygen. A second pill (misoprostol) then helps push the babies' remains out. While these drugs can have other uses, they are a deadly combination for preborn children.

In addition to ending the lives of babies, abortion pills are dangerous for the mothers who take them.

They have been found to cause four times as many complications as surgical abortions. A 2025 study found that 10 percent of women who take abortion pills need to get urgent treatment for problems afterward like infections, hemorrhages, or remains of the baby not having come out.

But the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has taken shortcuts over the years and removed guardrails around the pills. This allows the abortion industry to push the abortion pill more and more.

In 2021, the FDA made the abortion pill available even without an in-person doctor visit.

That means a woman might be taking the pill dangerously late in her pregnancy, or during a complicated pregnancy where it would be unsafe, and a doctor wouldn't know.

Being able to get abortion pills by a "telehealth" video appointment and mailed to your home, or at your local pharmacy, also means abortions are now

happening everywhere and anywhere, often with women suffering through the trauma of delivering their dead baby alone.

This easier access to abortion pills also increases the chances of their being used by abusive partners or sex trafficking criminals against a woman's will.

Because abortion pills can be sent through the mail, they are also often being sent from states with pro-abortion laws to women in states with pro-life laws. That means the pro-life states don't have the ability to protect life and women in need like they were supposed to after the Supreme Court finally overturned *Roe v. Wade* in 2022.

Some women who take the first abortion pill may have time to change their mind with an "abortion pill reversal" process, but some states are trying to block access to this last chance for life.

What can you do to help protect women and babies from abortion pills?

1. Pray for women who are deceived by the abortion industry.
2. Share the risks of the abortion pill with your friends.
3. Sign up for Respect Life Prayer and Action to help protect women and babies from these dangerous drugs at respectlife.org/prayer-and-action.

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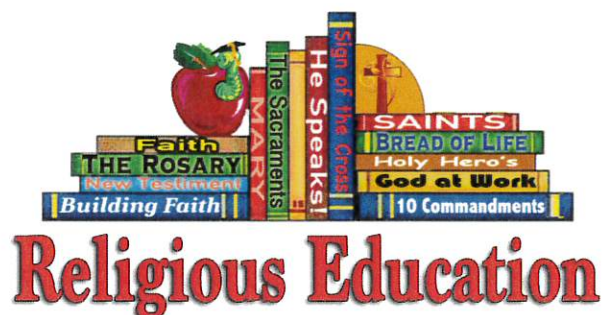
