

MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS

Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

HAPPY EASTER! The church takes us through the seasons of our salvation history every year, and the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus is the most important season. This is when we find out what our value is, how much is God is willing to pay to convince us He loves us and desires us to go to heaven to be with Him. It didn't have to be this way. God could have figuratively snapped his fingers to forgive us our sins and make us holy. He is God. He could have saved us any way He wanted, but he chose the most painful, violent, humiliating way possible. Why is that? Thomas Aquinas suggested three reasons:

It seems instinctive for humans to offer sacrifice to God for His favor or for repentance. You can see this in all pagan religions and in the Old Testament stories of the Jewish sacrifices.

The fact that God was willing to sacrifice His son for us this way should make clear to us how horrible sin is, that it takes such a high price to pay for our sins.

It illustrates how much God loves us that He is willing to pay such a price for us.

The church could have set up our liturgies to celebrate the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus every Sunday the same way all year long. But the Church in Her wisdom knows that we humans don't work that way. Just like we move through seasons of life, we move the seasons of salvation history with the church's liturgical seasons. Now we start the joyful Easter season after Christ arises and we sing the gloria again at Mass.

Jesus is fully God and fully human. He chose to lower himself to our level and to plumb the depths of humanity by His suffering, so we could never say that our God does not understand us or our sufferings. We could never say that obedience was a bad thing, because He was obedient to his Father. Jesus was like us in every way but sin. He willingly suffered His passion for us out of love for us and obedience to his father. All He wants in return is our love and our obedience to Him so He can raise us on Judgement Day to be like Him in glory.

This month lets pray that we and everyone we know learns to love and obey Jesus. Following is the next selection on the Mass from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com

Introductory Rites of the Mass:

- 1. Holy Water; we dip the fingers of our right hand into the water, (previously blessed by the Priest), we then make the sign of the cross, touching our forehead, breast, left shoulder and right shoulder, saying "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." This recollection of God's trinity recalls and renews when we were baptized with water and the sign of the cross was traced on our heads, claiming us for Christ.
- 2. Genuflection and kneeling; if you were to walk into Church and see Jesus standing at the altar in His robe and sandals, with His pierced hands, feet, and side, what would you do? Would you casually sit down? No, you would probably throw yourself face down on the floor begging His forgiveness! We recognize that Jesus is present in the Holy Eucharist in the tabernacle, body, blood, soul, and divinity. Genuflection and kneeling are minimal gestures of respect to Him. If unable to genuflect due to health problems, bow respectfully toward the tabernacle.
- 3. Standing: we traditionally stand to show respect and honor and when we are at prayer, and during the entrance procession, Gospel reading, Our Father etc.
- 4. Sitting is a posture of listening and meditation and is used for the non-Gospel readings and to meditate after Eucharist.
- 5. The procession of the Priest, Deacon, and altar servers is ceremonial and is similar to ancient royal processions.
- 6. Singing; For Sunday Mass we sing hymns at the entrance, offertory, Eucharist, and dismissal. This unifies us in our words, thoughts, and melody.
- 7. Greeting; the Priest begins with the sign of the Cross, again reminding us of our Baptism. He says, "The Lord be with you." Which is a greeting, blessing, and a statement of faith that the Lord is now with us. We reply "And with your spirit" which returns the greeting to the Priest.
- 8. Penitential Rite, Gloria; We need to gather as a unified congregation, so we may recall our common need for salvation and reconciliation with God (Penitential Rite and Lord, have mercy), and let our hearts sing with the praise and glory of God (Gloria). The use of these parts varies according to the Church season. At the end of the Penitential Rite the Priest prays the prayer of absolution, which forgives venial (non-deadly) sins.
- 9. The Collect Prayer: The Priest calls us into unified prayer. This is an opportunity to bring our hopes and fears and sacrifices and collect them together for the Priest to present to God. We respond "Amen" which means Yes, I believe! I would stake my life on what you just said!

APRIL — THE MONTH DEDICATED TO THE HOLY EUCHARIST

After the reflective period of Lent, Easter comes around, and then Catholics dedicate the entire month to celebrating Jesus's presence in their lives. Known as the Month of the Holy Eucharist, April is a time when the Catholic Church focuses on the Sacrament of Holy Communion. This is unique to the Catholic Church as we believe that the Eucharist is the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ.

Holy Eucharist

The Month of the Holy Eucharist, also called the Month of the Blessed Sacrament, celebrates Jesus manifesting himself in the Body and Blood while still under the appearance of bread and wine. The institution of the Eucharist started at the Last Supper by Jesus Himself, the last time Jesus and his disciples gathered before his crucifixion. The Catechism of the Catholic Church refers to the Eucharist as "the source and summit of our faith." In observation, everyone at Mass kneels in adoration during the transfiguration, the point that the bread and wine change into the Body and Blood of Jesus.

Ways to Observe

Catholics celebrate the Month of the Holy Eucharist in many ways. Here are a few:

- Begin to pray the Liturgy of the Hours, an ancient prayer that presents a path to praying through the Book of Psalms throughout the year.
- Recite the "Jesus Prayer" by repeating the phrase "Lord Jesus, have mercy on me, a sinner" until it brings you peace.
- Read about the life of a saint, and pray by his or her side. Many saints have their own prayers regarding the Eucharist.
- Pour out your heart directly to Jesus by telling Him all that comes to your mind, and listen for a response.
- Pray the Rosary, and ask Mary to join you while you do so.


Soul of Christ (Anima Christi) Prayer

Anima Christi is a prayer that you can say as an act of adoration, thanking Jesus for his continued presence on Earth. This prayer is from the 14th Century and is commonly said after receiving Holy Communion:

Soul of Christ, sanctify me
Body of Christ, save me
Blood of Christ, inebriate me
Water from Christ's side, wash me
Passion of Christ, strengthen me
O good Jesus, hear me
Within Thy wounds hide me
Suffer me not to be separated from Thee
From the malicious enemy defend me
In the hour of my death call me And bid me come unto Thee
That I may praise Thee with Thy saints
and with Thy angels Forever and ever
Amen.






Easter Prayer

'Arise, O Lord!': Discover the Holy Face Chaplet


Spiritual warfare is real, and as the U.S. Church embarks on this Eucharistic Revival together, you can be sure that the enemy will do everything in his power to undermine efforts to reignite devotion and fervor for the Eucharist. Thankfully, the Church offers her faithful powerful defenses against these attacks in the form of prayer. One prayer that is particularly effective against advances from the devil is the Holy Face Chaplet. This prayer centers around a battle cry of sorts that invokes the name of the Lord and compels his enemies to flee: "Arise, O Lord! and let Thy enemies be scattered, and let them that hate Thee flee from before Thy Face."

This chaplet is composed of a cross and 39 beads; of these are six single beads and 33 grouped beads. The 33 grouped beads represent the 33 years of the mortal life of Jesus. The first three beads recall the 30 years of his hidden life and are further divided into the five groups of six beads each, in honor of the senses of touch, hearing, sight, smell and taste of Jesus. As each of these senses were situated principally in his holy face, this prayer renders reparative homage for all the sufferings which Our Lord has endured in his face through each of these senses.

St. Athanasius said the devils hate the words, "Arise, O Lord and let they enemies be scattered," taken from Psalm 68, more than any other Scripture verse. When these words are spoken, enemies of the Lord have no choice but to cower and retreat. This prayer will serve as a powerful spiritual armament in the Eucharistic Revival. We encourage you to pray this chaplet at least once per week, and daily if possible. Arise, O Lord and thy enemies be scattered!


Congratulations to the Chambers Speech Team for making your way to the State Speech Meet. We are proud of you.


We also want to keep them in our prayers as they move forward with completing their sacraments.


HOME & FOREIGN MISSIONS COLLECTION WEEKEND OF APRIL 27TH—28TH

Many people around the world, including here in the United States, still have not heard the Good News of Jesus Christ, or if they have, lack the support they need to grow their faith. The Catholic faithful in the Omaha archdiocese have another opportunity to help the missionary work of the Church at home and abroad through the annual Home and Foreign Missions Collection during weekend Masses April 27th & 28th.

Also known as the archdiocese's "four-in-one collection," the effort raises money for four particular causes identified by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops as needing support, including:

- Aid to the Church in Latin America to support evangelization, pastoral programs and formation for laity, religious and seminarians as well as humanitarian assistance for people in need,
- Support for the Church in the Holy Land to care for and maintain holy sites,
- Providing funds for academic scholarships to attend the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., the only U.S. university with pontifical faculties,
- Support for the four in 10 U.S. dioceses considered mission territories, where the faithful all too often lack access to basic pastoral services like Mass, the sacraments and religious education.

This consolidated collection allows the Church to pool resources more efficiently and carry out its mission to draw all people to Jesus.

After all, their only child had a terminal illness. But it wasn't fair to keep him in her class. She had 18 other youngsters to teach and Jeremy was a distraction. Furthermore, he would never learn to read or write. Why waste any more time trying?

As she pondered the situation, guilt washed over her. "Oh God," she said aloud, "here I am complaining when my problems are nothing compared with that poor family! Please help me to be more patient with Jeremy."

From that day on, she tried hard to ignore Jeremy's noises and his blank stares. Then one day he limped to her desk, dragging his bad leg behind him. "I love you, Miss Miller," he exclaimed, loudly enough for the whole class to hear. The other children snickered, and Doris' face turned red. She stammered, "Wh-Why, that's very nice, Jeremy. Now please take your seat."

Spring came, and the children talked excitedly about the coming of Easter. Doris told them the story of Jesus, and then to emphasize the idea of new life springing forth, she gave each of the children a large plastic egg. "Now," she said to them, "I want you to take this home and bring it back tomorrow with something inside that shows new life. Do you understand?"

Yes, Miss Miller!" the children responded enthusiastically - all except for Jeremy. He just listened intently, his eyes never left her face. He did not even make his usual noises. Had he understood what she had said about Jesus' death and resurrection? Did he understand the assignment? Perhaps she should call his parents and explain the project to them. That evening, Doris' kitchen sink stopped up. She called the landlord and waited an hour for him to come by and unclog it. After that, she still had to shop for groceries, iron a blouse and prepare a vocabulary test for the next day. She completely forgot about phoning Jeremy's parents.

The next morning, 19 children came to school, laughing and talking as they placed their eggs in the large wicker basket on Miss Miller's desk. After they completed their Math lesson, it was time to open the eggs. In the first egg, Doris found a flower. "Oh yes, a flower is certainly a sign of new life," she said. "When plants peek through the ground we know that spring is here." A small girl in the first row waved her arms. "That's my egg, Miss Miller," she called out. The next egg contained a plastic butterfly, which looked very real. Doris held it up. "We all know that a caterpillar changes and grows into a beautiful butterfly. Yes, that is new life, too" Little Judy smiled proudly and said, "Miss Miller, that one is mine."

Next Doris found a rock with moss on it. She explained that the moss, too, showed life. Billy spoke up from the back of the classroom. "My Daddy helped me!" he beamed. Then Doris opened the fourth egg. She gasped. The egg was empty! Surely it must be Jeremy's, she thought, and, of course, he did not understand her instructions. If only she had not forgotten to phone his parents. Because she did not want to embarrass him, she quietly set the egg aside and reached for another. Suddenly Jeremy spoke up. "Miss Miller, aren't you going to talk about my egg?" Flustered, Doris replied, "but Jeremy - your egg is empty!" He looked into her eyes and said softly, "Yes, but Jesus' tomb was empty too!"

Time stopped. When she could speak again. Doris asked him, "Do you know why the tomb was empty?" "Oh yes!" Jeremy exclaimed. "Jesus was killed and put in there. Then his Father raised him up!"

The recess bell rang. While the children excitedly ran out to the school yard, Doris cried. The cold inside her melted completely away.

Three months later Jeremy died. Those who paid their respects at the mortuary were surprised to see 19 eggs on top of his casket, all of them empty.
