FROM THE DESK OF FATHER STARMAN—

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Catholic Parishes of Western Holt and Boyd Counties,

What kind of parents would meekly comply with an order to kill their only child? What kind of God would ask such a thing? Disturbing questions arise from this weekend's first reading (Gen 22: 1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18), which opens: "God put Abraham to the test." The narrative that follows sounds a lot like what Scripture scholars have come to call a "call story." God calls Abraham by name, and Abraham twice responds with the same words Samuel used in his own call story (in 1 Samuel 3) and that Isaiah did in his: "Here I am!"

Call stories emphasize the eager willingness of a person to respond to God as well as the great sacrifices they are asked to make for the sake of the mission that God offers them. Genesis 12, prior to this weekend's passage, recounts the call of Abraham and his willingness even at the age of seventy-five, to leave his home in Haran to journey into the unknown. Abraham has shown himself responsive to all that God asks; he has committed himself fully to God in a covenant (Gen 15: 1-21). Unsettling questions arise as we ponder why God would now demand that Abraham sacrifice his precious son, an act that would seem to make impossible the fulfillment of God's promise of numerous descendants.

Might it be that the biblical writer is relating how Abraham continued to experience trials and tribulations, even as he tried his best to follow God's call? Having the mindset of whatever happens is God's doing, the writer attributes the "testing" of Abraham of God's intent. Did Abraham find, as we do, that even when we try to be most faithful, tragic things still happen? Or does this story in fact recall a time when Isaac's life was in jeopardy and Abraham felt responsible, and helpless to protect him? What parent has not had such frightening experiences? Parents also know that loving their children demands they be willing to let them go. All love relationships flourish only when there is freedom to let go of what is most precious, so as to receive it back as a gift. Even if Abraham had lost Isaac, that would not have nullified God's covenant of love.

The story of Abraham and Isaac invites us to reflect on times when, even though we try to be faithful, we do not correctly hear what God is saying. In rabbinic traditions, some sages have interpreted this text not as a test of Abraham, but of his misunderstanding. The author of one of the earliest midrashic works, called Genisis Rabbah, puts these startling words into God's mouth as he speaks to Abraham: "What, do you think that I meant for you to slay him? No! I said only for you to take him up . . . and now I say take him down." Perhaps an important lesson to be drawn here, the, is that practices of communal discernment offer an alternative model to that of relying the decisions of one person who might misunderstand what God has said. Often God speaks through a community of believers more clearly than through a single individual.
