

#### MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



We recently heard the gospel reading about the man who was thrown out of the wedding feast because he didn't have a white wedding garment on. It never seemed fair to me that the king threw the man out for not wearing a wedding garment, but we

must understand that free wedding garments were being handed out at the door, and this man refused the free garment.

The free garment is white and represents saving grace, especially in the sacraments. The free garment is the white baptismal gown. It is the white dress and shirt at first communion and confirmation. It is the spotless white soul we have after a good confession; it is the white wedding dress. It is the white vestments that clergy wear when they are ordained. It is the white funeral pall that will be placed on our casket the day of our funeral. The free garment is the grace of salvation, and the sacraments that give that grace, which are offered freely to all of us. This man rejected the grace that would have let him into heaven.

We know that the king represents God the Father, the bridegroom represents God the Son, but who is the bride? This gospel does not say, but If you look in the Book of Revelation, in chapter 19 we read about the wedding feast of the Lamb, which also uses imagery of a wedding feast when Jesus marries His bride. So, who is the bride in the wedding feast? In the Wedding Feast of the Lamb, we learn that we are the bride! The church! That is what happens in heaven. We "marry" (in a very profound manner of speaking) the Lamb, the Son, Jesus!

We cannot earn our way into the wedding feast with good works, but we do have work to do and choices to make. First, we need to decide to come to the wedding feast of heaven. We need to accept the free offer of the wedding garment of salvation in the sacraments. We also need to become Jesus' friend to be joined with Him and we need to repent of anything that stains our wedding garment so He can wash it clean again if necessary.

Jesus was talking to the Jews of His time, but the context of scripture changes with the audience. It is now 2000 years later, and we are not Jewish Pharisees, but today Jesus is still talking to us. Today, we westerners are the first group who have been invited to the wedding feast, God says to us that everything is ready; come to the feast. But most of us ignore the invitation and go away, one to his farm, another to his business.

#### Why do I have to go to Mass?

Why are we obligated to go to Mass? Why does a husband kiss his wife? If he doesn't, there is something wrong with the marriage. If we have been away from someone we love for a week and we don't miss him or her, or if we don't look forward to going back to Mass after a week, we do not have the relationship we should. If we work on it, however, we can develop that relationship.

Imagine someone was giving away a million dollars to everyone who went to Mass. Actually, it is better than that. God is giving away everything, His Son.

The Catholic Church is very specific about the obligation of attendance at Sunday Mass and on Holy Days. This is one of God's Commandments. He did this for our good, not for His. He knew that if we went to Mass, we would receive grace to improve our relationship with Him and conform ourselves to Him so we could join with Him in heaven. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin (CCC 2181).

If this seems harsh, imagine you are in a loving relationship with someone, and they refuse to see you or spend time with you. Would there be something wrong with that relationship? If you were God in that relationship, would you invite this person to spend eternity in heaven with you after that rejection? The relationship has been ruptured and can only be healed by repentance and absolution in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Everyone wants to go to heaven, but no one wants to die to get there. If we go to Mass and get involved, then we are in heaven here on earth! We are in the presence of God and His love. Angels and our deceased loved ones surround us, worshiping God with us (see CCC 1137-1139). That is a foretaste of what happens in heaven! Of course, it will all be more obvious to us after we die.

# NEWS AND NOTES ... NEWS AND NOTE

Look at your bulletin's Mass list. Most churches put names next to the Mass. Those people are in need of prayers and most of the time parishes pray for people who have passed on. Whereas canonized saints we know are in Heaven, we make sure to do all we can for others who have passed, especially those in most need, by praying that they, too, are in Heaven.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us about the state of purification called purgatory (paragraph 1031). Nothing evil is allowed in Heaven. Jesus' sacrifice is all transforming, not just a "cover-up." What I mean by this is that we believe that Christ's sacrifice is not just making us appear to be pure, but when we really accept Him wholly we are transformed. We just need to receive Him.

As imperfect, fallen humans, we might likely not enter into eternal life completely spotless, and that is why His love continues to purify us in the state of purgatory. What's left of sin is taken away. Traditionally, people ask for 40 Masses to be said for a person who has passed. Forty biblically represents a long time, so people were aiming to help someone even if that person was said to be in Purgatory for a long time. The afterlife doesn't necessarily have a sense of time, so when someone speaks in manners of time, it's just us finite humans attempting to understand the afterlife. We should prepare ourselves to be rid of all sin as soon as possible through prayer, the sacraments given by God, and constant conversion. That way, we can enjoy the Kingdom of Heaven where we all belong "sooner"—so to speak.

Until then, we still strive to understand and visualize purgatory. For example, Dante's famous  $Divine\ Comedy$  is a poem about a character's journey through heaven, hell, and purgatory. If you want to understand Purgatory better, check out this article on it -


#### TROUBLE TREE


