MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Merry Christmas Prayer Warriors!

Yes, it is still Christmas! The world says that the Christmas season began on Thanksgiving, or maybe Halloween. In the church, and hopefully your home, the Christmas season begins with the first Christmas Mass and ends on the Feast of the Epiphany on January 7, when the Wise Men come. (These are the 12 days of Christmas.) What the rest of the world calls Christmas season is Advent, a time of waiting and expectation for Christmas, and a little solemn.

I think we should use this time to prayerfully consider what it means for God to come to earth to intentionally to suffer and die for mere mortals. We Christians like to think, "Oh yes, Christmas is about Jesus coming to earth for our salvation, not just Santa Clause." But do we really comprehend how amazing that is? God is so far above us in glory and power and we are so small in comparison that we cannot really grasp how amazing that is. All of the pagan "gods" of mythology, the Islamic understanding of Allah, and even the Jewish understanding of God teach that we are to suffer and serve God. Only Christianity teaches that God came to suffer and serve humans. The birth of Jesus truly is the pivot point in history when everything changed.

If we have been brought up as a Christian, we have "known" all of our lives what Jesus did for us, and it is a little too familiar; we take it for granted. There are a few days left in the season to ponder this. I recommend that you take this to prayer, preferably before the Blessed Sacrament, and focus on love and gratitude for what God, and especially Jesus, did for you 2000 years ago.

Following is the next selection on the Mass from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com.

Music is the most important art because it is part of the Mass (see CCC 1156). In the extraordinary form of the Mass, High Masses are all sung. Gregorian chant was developed in the Middle Ages and is the most perfect Church music (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, 116) because the congregation blends their voices, so they are singing together. The simple melody allows us to concentrate on the words and what they mean. Remember that we are to worship as a community and not as individuals and blending our voices helps that.

Catholics use a lot of symbols in our Church: holy water, incense, crucifixes, statues, etc., are used because as humans, we are both spirit and material body. "These are not just things, but symbols of deeper things." (Dean Koontz, 2012). Physical things help us to focus on and to get connected to God even if we do not fully understand the intellectual basis of our faith. God uses created things to reveal Himself.



The Church also specifies postures to be used during the Mass. (General Instruction of the Roman Missal).

We stand during dialogue with God or with each other while praying.

We sit when listening and meditating.

We kneel when Jesus is on the altar.

JANUARY—THE MONTH DEVOTED TO THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS


The month is January is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus and His Holy Childhood. Liturgically, this makes sense because we just celebrated Jesus' birth and continue to celebrate the season of Christmas!

<u>His Holy Name should not be taken in vain.</u> That's even a commandment: You will not take the Lord's Name in vain! Check out the litany of His Name, find or create your own prayer, or simply say His Name lovingly throughout your day.

Reflection Questions on the Holy Name of Jesus:

- Do you use His Name in vain?
- Do you allow others to use Your God and Savior's name in vain around you?
- What creative response can you make to when others use His Name in vain?
- How can you use His Name with reverence?
- What can you do to remember the importance of His Holy Name?

His Holy Childhood is celebrated in the devotion to the Infant of Prague. His Holy Childhood is important because Christ is fully human and fully God, which is a core belief of our faith. Look at pictures and statues of the Holy Family.



FAMILY TALK TIME

"It is the divine name that alone brings salvation." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, No. 432)

The month of January is dedicated to the holy name of Jesus. The Church celebrates the feast of the Most Holy Name of Jesus on Jan. 3. Take time to celebrate its power and significance with your family, for the name of Jesus is truly the Name above All Names.

Invocation of the Holy Name

Say this prayer many times throughout the day this month:

"Blessed be the most holy name of Jesus without end!"

The Sacred Scriptures and Saints

St. Paul tells us "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth" (Phil 2:10). Mark writes, "In my name ... they will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover" (Mk 16:17-18). And Jesus himself tells us, "Whatever you ask the Father in my name he will give you" (Jn 16:23).

Although the name of Jesus has been respected since the days of the apostles, it has been honored with a special feast day since the end of the 15th century. St. Bernard, St. Bernardine of Siena and St. John Capistrano are among the saints who have had a special devotion to the name of Jesus.

Under His Protection

The monogram used for the Holy Name of Jesus includes the three letters IHS, which come from consonants in the Greek word for Jesus (IHSOUS). Over time, IHS has also become associated with the first letters of the Latin phrase Iesus Hominum Salvator ("Jesus, Savior of Men"). The letters IHS were often inscribed above doorways in medieval Italy for protection of the inhabitants.

Write the name of Jesus with chalk above your front door.

God Calls Us by Name

In Hebrew, the name Jesus means "God saves" and reminds us that God the Father and Jesus are one. Read the account of the naming of Jesus in Matthew 1:21-23.

Discuss the meaning behind your family name and each individual's name. Share stories about how each family member was given their name.

- YOU JUST DID.


LIVE LENT TOGETHER


ST. JOSEPH'S-AMELIA

PRO-LIFE—LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Pro-abortionists unveiled ballot initiative language Nov. 16 seeking to establish a "right to abortion until birth" in the Nebraska constitution. Joined by you, the Nebraska Catholic Conference, along with our statewide pro-life friends, Nebraska Family Alliance, Nebraska Right to Life, and Susan B. Anthony Pro-Life America, will be wholly dedicated to defeating this effort as we fight for the very lives of preborn babies and moms,

The language released by pro-abortionists reads: "All persons shall have a fundamental right to abortion until fetal viability, or when needed to protect the life or health of the pregnant patient, without interference from the state or its political subdivisions. Fetal viability means the point in pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the patient's treating health care practitioner, there is a significant likelihood of the fetus' sustained survival outside the uterus without the application of extraordinary medical measures." What does this language *actually* mean?

"Fetal viability" is defined to allow second- and third-trimester abortions. It will give abortionists the power over life and death by leaving it to their "judgment" whether a preborn baby is "viable" or not. For example, babies who need "extraordinary medical measures," like a short stay in the NICU, could be judged by an abortionist to be "nonviable" and aborted in the third trimester.

While pro-abortionists are attempting to frame their language as simply allowing abortions until viability, the "health" exception is a major and dangerous loophole that will result in abortions until birth. Courts have found the term "health" to include non-medical factors, such as mental, spiritual, financial, or familial health.

Asserting a fundamental right to abortion "without interference from the state" will put all current safeguards at risk and undermine women's health and safety. This includes safeguards that require obtaining informed consent, performing medical screenings, seeing a physician in person, or prohibiting abortion pills being sent by mail from individuals with no medical credentials.

The language "all persons" and "patients" will give minor children a right to abortion. This will cause obvious harm to children by subjecting them to the abortion industry, and it will eviscerate parental rights. Parents will lack authority to consent or even know if their minor daughter seeks an abortion. They may also have no recourse if their daughter is harmed during the abortion.

While pro-abortionists attempt to sound reasonable to Nebraskans about their ballot language, their proposal is the farthest thing from reasonable. It is abortion-on-demand, up until birth. Already, pro-abortion advocates, like Planned Parenthood, are lying through their teeth, denying the extreme nature of their proposal. But at the end of the day, this proposal is a fundamental attack on human life, and should be categorically rejected by Nebraskans.

Nebraska's current law allows abortion until the 12th week of pregnancy and provides exceptions for rape, incest, and the life of the mother. As we have seen with previous polling. this law is widely supported by Nebraskans across the state. But the pro-abortion ballot initiative would wipe out this and other important laws, including protecting babies from dismemberment abortion, providing informed consent to mothers about abortion pill reversal, and protecting babies whom research has demonstrated can definitively feel and react to pain.

What are the next steps for us as Catholics and pro-life advocates?

Decline to Sign. Pro-abortion groups, formed under the misguided name of "Protect Our Rights Nebraska," have formally launched their petition drive effort. To put a constitutional amendment to a vote of the people in November 2024, they need to collect roughly 120,000 signatures of registered voters from across the state. They have until approximately July of 2024 to collect these signatures. If you encounter petitioners, charitably take up their time talking about the dangerous petition, to prevent other people from engaging and signing And of course, decline to sign!

Pray and fast. We need Nebraska Catholics—and all Christians—to pray and fast. As we know, this is a spiritual battle, one for lives and souls. Pray and fast that pro-abortionists' efforts are thwarted at every step and that they utterly fail in their efforts to legalize abortion until birth.

Stay up to date. Stay connected to the Nebraska Catholic Conference—and get your family and friends connected. 


