

MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

Have you noticed that you have had more things to pray about lately? As Catholics, we are used to praying for our deceased, our sick and suffering, and for fallen-away loved ones. Now, however, we are confronting anger, sorrow and confusion in our institutions that we have never seen in our lifetimes. And that is just in our national politics, it is even worse in the church! The church has always been our refuge from worldly problems, and now it is suffering in a way we have not seen since the Protestant revolt 500 years ago.

Instead of laity depending on the church to help us, we are called to help bind up the wounds of the church and help to recover her health. In June of 1972, Archbishop Fulton Sheen said this about the laity: "Who's going to save our Church? It's not our bishops, it's not our priests and it is not the religious. It is up to you, the people. You have the minds, the eyes and the ears to save the Church. Your mission is to see that the priests act like priests, your bishops act like bishops, and the religious act like religious."

Laity (and deacons and priests) do not get a vote on how to deal with doctrinal issues. Bishops and popes do get a vote, but even they need to be slaves to divine revelation as revealed in sacred scripture and the magisterial traditions. Our role is to pray fervently that the Holy Spirit guide them correctly to God's will for his church. God's will can be understood as a wind blowing us across the lake to our harbor of holiness and heaven. A good sailor can, with hard work make a sailboat tack against the wind to a different destination, but it is difficult and eventually the sailor will tire, or falter and God will gently work His will again. Whatever is happening now, realize that God is still blowing us towards holiness and heaven and eventually, God's Will will be done. (See also Catechism of the Catholic Church paragraphs 880-900)

What we must never do is to separate ourselves from the church, our bishops, and our pope, even when they are unwise or deficient in their duties. The church will eventually re-orient itself, and if we have cut ourselves off from her, we risk our own souls. We need to get back to basics. Go to Mass, go to confession, teach your children the faith, take care of your neighbors and pay less attention to church politics. Stay close to Jesus. The church belongs to Jesus, not to any deacon, priest, bishop, cardinal, or pope, or internet provocateur.

This month pray for peace, truth, and unity in our church. Following is the next selection on the Mass from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com

Protestants claim Catholics added a lot of things to the Mass later, in the Middle Ages, and that they are the ones who restored worship to what the Apostles did. This is false. In 150 A.D. Saint Justin the Martyr described what happened in the Mass in a report to the Roman Emperor (First Apology, chapter 65). It is the same Mass we recognize today. In his report he described the following:

- 1. An opening song to join together.
- 2. We confess our sins to God and each other.
- 3. Gloria, or praise for our sins being forgiven.
- 4. Readings of sacred writings.
- 5. Homily to explain the Scriptures and how they are relevant today
- 6. Reciting the Creed, which defines Christianity.
- 7. Petitions, asking God for our needs.
- 8. Offerings so we can share our labor and time.
- 9. Bringing of the bread and wine.
- 10. Eucharistic prayer asking to be saved by Jesus' death.
- 11. Breaking of the bread.
- 12. Taking Jesus into us.
- 13. Prayer and blessing with dismissal.

This is exactly what we still do today, 2000 years later!

FEBRUARY—THE MONTH DEVOTED TO THE HOLY FAMILY

The month of February is dedicated to the Holy Family in the Catholic Church. How does the Church honor the Holy Family, both during this month and throughout the year?

The Catholic Church Honors the Holy Family

The Holy Family is remembered several times during the liturgical year:

- +++ At Christmas.
- +++ At the feast of the Holy Family, celebrated the Sunday after Christmas.
- +++ At the Presentation, celebrated February 2nd.
- +++ During the entire month of February.

Families Today Are Under Attack

Our Lady of Fatima warned Sr. Lucia about attacks against marriage and the family. This is occurring today in our culture, societal mindset, and in organizations whose missions are literally to dismantle the traditional family.

Each Member is a Role Model, Even for Today

With a life centered on the Father, St. Joseph was a just man. He was also a spiritual leader and protector of his family in daily life and journeys to Bethlehem, Egypt, and Nazareth. Also called St. Joseph the Worker, he labored and materially provided for his family.

Mary dutifully cared for her family and home. Rooted in Scripture and repeated in approved Marian apparitions, she was humble, modest, pious, loving. In her "yes" to the Father, she was a disciple of Jesus His entire life.

Both human and divine, Jesus was obedient to His parents, the Law of Moses, and lived within the confines of His family and town. Also dedicated to the Will of His Father, He taught and ministered to people at their points of greatest need, even laying down His life for each of us.

A Model for All Families

The Holy Family is a model for all families everywhere because God the Father made it so. He could have sent Jesus to earth in any number of ways, but He chose to place Jesus in a family with a father and mother.

In addition, the Holy Family is a model for domestic life. When we center our family life on Christ and live the life of the Church in our homes, this is referred to as the domestic church.

"...the Holy Family is the icon of the domestic Church, called to pray together. The family is the domestic Church and must be the first school of prayer....pray together as a family at the school of the Holy Family of Nazareth and thereby really to become of one heart and soul, a true family."

Ways To Make the Holy Family a Part of Your Life

- Connect with the Holy Family. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal one thing you have in common with the Holy Family, or with Jesus, Mary, or Joseph individually.
- Incorporate short prayers into your day, especially during difficulties: "Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, help me!" "Holy Family, help us be holy!"
- If your family is over-scheduled, create a time to bring everyone together with a meal or game night. Begin with a spontaneous prayer of gratitude for time together.
- Pray as a family. Use a prayer card or listen to a prayer together on the <u>iCatholicRadio app</u>. Take turns praying petitions for the needs of your family and household. Pray in gratitude for blessings received. Do your best to attend Mass together.
- Keep a prayer card or picture of the Holy Family in a prominent place in your home as a holy reminder.
- When writing a list, journaling, or taking notes, be like Fulton Sheen. Write JMJ at the top of your paper, calling to mind Jesus, Mary, and Joseph to guide you in your daily duties.

Recite a prayer to the Holy Family and also consider consecrating your family to them as well.

What to Do When Your Family Doesn't Look Like the Holy Family

There are times and situations in which our families do not resemble the Holy Family. But it's okay. God calls us to be faithful, not perfect. Pray to the Holy Family for the longings of your heart, healing, provision, or whatever difficulties you face. Ask the Holy Spirit to enter your situation for God's Will to be done.

If you are not married or do not have children, God may still call you to be a spiritual father or mother, or even a spiritual child to someone He brings into your life.

Ask God who He wishes you to minister to. Those appointments are divine and important.



Underneath the target was a picture of Jesus. A hush fell over the room as each student viewed the mangled picture of Jesus; holes and jagged marks covered His face, and His eyes were pierced.

Dr. Smith said only these words, "In as much as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me." Matthew 25:40 No other words were necessary; the tears filled eyes of the students—focused only on the picture of Christ.


Christians Encounter Christ "A personal encounter with Christ"

SYMBOLS OF LENT

There are a lot of Lenten symbols you can use when to teach your children about Lent and Holy Week. If you do an activity based on a symbol and create a tangible object it will serve as a reminder of the symbol and its meaning.

The <u>pretzel</u> is a symbol of Lent with a fun legend about it. A monk made special bread without eggs or milk (because they didn't use these in Lent) and shaped it so that it would look like the arms of someone praying. In those days people often prayed with their hands crossed over their chest. You can find many activities online related to the legend of the pretzel.

<u>Water</u> can also be a Lenten symbol. It has many meanings and one is as a reminder of our baptism. Making a bowl or other container for water and then encouraging your child to place it somewhere in your home to remember their baptism could be a meaningful activity. You could also suggest that children ask you about their own baptisms and whether there are any photos of them on the day they were baptized.

<u>Palm leaves</u> are a Lenten symbol and you can find directions online to make the traditional Palm Sunday ones into crosses.

The <u>cocoon</u> with the caterpillar inside which transforms into a butterfly is just one of many symbols for Lent which symbolize new life. There are plenty of crafts and other activities related to this symbol.

Children love animals and the <u>donkey</u> is a symbol for Lent. There are stories and books written from the perspective of the donkey that Jesus rode on as he entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.

The <u>rooster</u> is a symbol of Lent and reminds us that Peter denied Jesus three times before the rooster crowed. The story of Peter's denial and how Jesus forgave him is a good story to share with your child to teach them about friendship and forgiveness.

An article from the Ministry Matters website called "Lent for Kids: Focusing on God's Time" includes activities for each week of Lent focusing on symbols.

St. Valentine refused to deny Christ before the Emperor Claudius in the year 280 and won the jeweled crown of martyrdom by his faithful witness. The feast of St. Valentine was first established in 496 by Pope Gelasius I.
