MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

Sunday, December 3rd, begins Advent season. Despite what the world is telling you, it is not Christmas season yet. For Catholics, Christmas season starts at the Christmas vigil Mass and ends on Epiphany January 5. The 12 days of Christmas. That is our joyful time as Christians. The church also sets out a time of waiting and longing and expectation for Christmas called Advent. Advent is sort of like Lent. Lent is a time of active waiting and expectation for Easter, and Advent is a time of active waiting for Christmas. We should be active in our waiting, not just sitting back and waiting for Christmas and Jesus to happen. But although most Christians seem to take Lent seriously, Advent has been overwhelmed by the commercialization of Christmas, the busyness of the season; work parties, family parties and obligations of giving kids a special time and jumping ahead to celebrating Jesus' birth before it occurs. But before it is too late, let's take a deep breath to try to experience Advent; actively waiting and expecting Jesus. It's hard to enjoy the feast if you are never hungry enough to have an appetite.

When we die or Jesus returns, we are not going to be judged based on whether we are "nice" or not. If we go through life without robbing banks or committing adultery, that is not enough to get us into heaven. Scripture tells us that we are called to fellowship with Jesus. Fellowship, friendship, relationship. As our evangelical friends correctly say; "A personal relationship with Jesus Christ." By the time we die, we need to be a friend of Jesus. From that fact we can reason that if we are His friend, we will follow his commandments and stop robbing banks or committing adultery if that is our thing. If we are His friend, we will want to come to Mass to worship Him and spend time with Him and we will talk to Him daily in prayer. If we are His friend, we will treat our neighbors with love and respect because they are His children too. If we are His friend, we will receive the Eucharist because that means we are taking our friend Jesus into us and allowing Him to slowly change us to be more like Him. Our religion is based on relationship not just rules. When we die, we do not want to knock on the Pearly Gates and have Jesus come out and say "Who are you again? I don't think I know you. You had better go to the other place!"

For the next month let's pray that the Advent season helps to draw back our fallen away family and friends to the Church, and all of us to a more personal friendship with Jesus. Following is a selection from my book on the Mass.

THE MASS FOLLOWS THE LIFE OF JESUS:

Jesus' first 3 years in Galilee was Jesus' liturgy of the Word — reflected by our preaching the Word in the Mass. (Our Mass follows the example of Jewish worship up to this point.) At Palm Sunday Jesus transitions, and the crowds sing hosanna in the highest just as we do in the middle of Mass. On Good Friday Jesus was sacrificed for us — reflected in the liturgy of the Eucharist.

In the Mass, the Priest says, "do this in temembrance of me." It is better translated as "bring this back to life in me." The Mass is not just a memorial. Jesus' sacrifice 2000 years ago is made present to us in an unbloody manner. The sacrifice of the Mass is like a periscope or a time machine. We look into it now and see what happened 2000 years ago to the Paschal mystery of Christ is celebrated, not repeated... (CCC 1104). He died only one time, but His suffering then pays for the ems of all thought details, during, and after, including us (see CCC 601).

Eucharist is the word for the kfulness, and it is the central part of the Mass because the most powerful graces come from it (see CCC 1407).

DECEMBER—THE MONTH DEVOTED TO THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, it is a great time to ask some important questions about Mary, like: "What's the deal with Catholics and Mary? Why do Catholics worship Mary? (We don't.) How could a virgin give birth? What is the Immaculate Conception?" and "Why do Catholics pray to Mary?"

These are questions to ask throughout the time of Advent. It is a time when are all invited to accompany the go deeper into the mystery of the Incarnation.

Why does God ask for the help of a young Jewish Girl? How is it that he would entrust his Son to her care? What keys can we discover for our own Christian life when we reflect on Mary and her life, found in the Gospels?

Mary's Participation

When she visited her cousin, Elizabeth, Mary proclaimed, "Behold, from now on will all ages call me blessed. The mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is His name" (Luke 1:48-49). Mary proclaimed these powerful words not in arrogance but in humble recognition of the wonderful plan of God for all men and women, meaning, for you and me. In unfolding His plan, God invited Mary to actively participate in it. Such an invitation to man and woman by God to participate in the divine plan is not something new. This began from the beginning of creation: Adam and Eve were invited to become stewards of all that God has made (Genesis 1:28-30). However, Adam and Eve failed to play their parts with respect to God's plan. With Mary, on the other hand, that all generations will call her blessed is a simple recognition that she indeed played her part precisely according to God's plan. Along with her son, Jesus Christ, we see the new Adam and the new Eve. Jesus and Mary offer themselves to us not only as examples but the models for all men and women who desire to cooperate and collaborate with God.

Mary's Magnificat

We are created by God "in His own image and likeness" (Genesis 1:26-27). Wow! Anyone who reflects on this wonderful reality could definitely live a happy life and die a happy death. This, of course, means that we need to take ourselves more seriously. We cannot and should not settle for living our lives only on the "natural" plane, but rather we must open our eyes to something greater, something supernatural. Mary teaches us to do precisely this in her Magnificat. There, she recognizes and gives thanks for the Lord's action in human history: God is not a far away God, He is one that cares for his Creatures. Out of love, his supernatural grace penetrates, illuminates, and transforms the natural reality. In her Fiat, her "yes" to the Lord and his Plan, she becomes the model for all Christians, for all those who open their lives to the concrete action of the Lord and cooperate with it.

The Virgin Birth

This is utterly inconceivable in human terms but not for God. But that Mary was, is and remained a virgin after the birth of Jesus points to two realities: Jesus is the Son of God and has Mary for his mother. When God invites us to work with Him, divine grace does not destroy but rather perfects our human nature (Saint Thomas Aquinas).

The Immaculate Conception

That Mary was conceived without sin and remained unstained by sin throughout her life only indicates the power of God's grace, given to us through and in Jesus Christ. In the "natural" plane, no one could affect any influence on the past. But in the "supernatural" plane, God's grace in Christ flows not just in the present but also overflows in the past and in the future. Mary stands as a witness that God's grace knows not the boundaries of time and space.

Mary's Intercession

The Miracle at Cana (John 2:1-12) shows us two things: That Mary is the mother who shows concern for all her children. Her maternal voice is so effective that her Son, Jesus, hears it. For these reasons, Catholics have the courage to ask Mary our Mother to intercede, that is, to pray for us, her adopted sons and daughters in Christ.

How Can We Live Like Mary?

- 1. Be attentive to the Word of God as it comes to us in the Scriptures and in the Tradition of the Church. Allow it to grow in us. We may not find ourselves having to carry Jesus in our womb but we are invited to carry Jesus in our hearts and to give birth to him in the goodness of our thoughts, words, and actions.
- 2. Be attentive to Jesus Christ. As Christians, we are those who are like Christ. It is important that we encounter Jesus as a person in the Gospels, in our personal prayer, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in one another. In as much as Jesus is true God, we encounter in him our very personal God. And in as much as Jesus is true man, we find in him our true selves something that Adam and Eve failed to comprehend and achieve. Mary's rosary is a concrete way of walking with Mary through the life of her Son, Jesus.
- 3. Be attentive to one another. We are a family: we have God as our Father, Jesus as our brother, and Mary as our mother. We live in communion and so it must "supernaturally" come to us to help one another be it in the form of material assistance or spiritual help as in praying to God for one another.

THE LITTLE MATCH GIRL By Hans Christian Andersen (1846)

It was terribly cold and nearly dark on the last evening of the old year, and the snow was falling fast. In the cold and the darkness, a poor little girl, with bare head and naked feet, roamed through the streets.

It is true she had on a pair of slippers when she left home, but they were not of much use. They were very large, so large, indeed, that they had belonged to her mother, and the poor little creature had lost them in running across the street to avoid two carriages that were rolling along at a terrible rate. One of the slippers she could not find, and a boy seized upon the other and ran away with it, saying that he could use it as a cradle, when he had children of his own. So the little girl went on with her little naked feet, which were quite red and blue with the cold.

In an old apron she carried a number of matches, and had a bundle of them in her hands. No one had bought anything of her the whole day, nor had anyone given her even a penny. Shivering with cold and hunger, she crept along; poor little child, she looked the picture of misery. The snowflakes fell on her long, fair hair, which hung in curls on her shoulders, but she regarded them not. Lights were shining from every window, and there was a savory smell of roast goose, for it was New-year's eve—yes, she remembered that.

In a corner, between two houses, one of which projected beyond the other, she sank down and huddled herself together. She had drawn her little feet under her, but she could not keep off the cold; and she dared not go home, for she had sold no matches, and could not take home even a penny of money. Her father would certainly beat her; besides, it was almost as cold at home as here, for they had only the roof to cover them, through which the wind howled, although the largest holes had been stopped up with straw and rags. Her little hands were almost frozen with the cold.

Ah! perhaps a burning match might be some good, if she could draw it from the bundle and strike it against the wall, just to warm her fingers. She drew one out—
"scratch!" how it sputtered as it burnt! It gave a warm, bright light, like a little candle, as she held her hand over it. It was really a wonderful light. It seemed to the little girl that she was sitting by a large iron stove, with polished brass feet and a brass ornament. How the fire burned! and seemed so beautifully warm that the child stretched out her feet as if to warm them, when, lo! the flame of the match went out, the stove vanished, and she had only the remains of the half-burnt match in her hand.

She rubbed another match on the wall. It burst into a flame, and where its light fell upon the wall it became as transparent as a veil, and she could see into the room. The table was covered with a snowy white table-cloth, on which stood a splendid dinner service, and a steaming roast goose, stuffed with apples and dried plums. And what was still more wonderful, the goose jumped down from the dish and waddled across the floor, with a knife and fork in its breast, to the little girl. Then the match went out, and there remained nothing but the thick, damp, cold wall before her.

She lighted another match, and then she found herself sitting under a beautiful Christmas tree. It was larger and more beautifully decorated than the one which she had seen through the glass door at the rich merchant's. Thousands of tapers were burning upon the green branches, and colored pictures, like those she had seen in the show-windows, looked down upon it all. The little one stretched out her hand towards them, and the match went out.

The Christmas lights rose higher and higher, till they looked to her like the stars in the sky. Then she saw a star fall, leaving behind it a bright streak of fire. "Someone is dying," thought the little girl, for her old grandmother, the only one who had ever loved her, and who was now dead, had told her that when a star falls, a soul was going up to God. She again rubbed a match on the wall, and the light shone round her; in the brightness stood her old grandmother, clear and shining, yet mild and loving in her appearance.

"Grandmother," cried the little one, "O take me with you; I know you will go away when the match burns out; you will vanish like the warm stove, the roast goose, and the large, glorious Christmas tree." And she made haste to light the whole bundle of matches, for she wished to keep her grandmother there. And the matches glowed with a light that was brighter than the noon-day, and her grandmother had never appeared so large or so beautiful. She took the little girl in her arms, and they both flew upwards in brightness and joy far above the earth, where there was neither cold nor hunger nor pain, for they were with God.

In the dawn of morning there lay the poor little one, with pale cheeks and smiling mouth, leaning against the wall; she had been frozen to death on the last evening of the year; and the New-year's sun rose and shone upon a little corpse! The child still sat, in the stiffness of death, holding the matches in her hand, one bundle of which was burnt. "She tried to warm herself," said some. No one imagined what beautiful things she had seen, nor into what glory she had entered with her grandmother, on New Year's day.



On November 1st the Ss. Peter and Paul 5th and 6th grade students studied about Plenary Indulgences and their requirements.


We were determined to gain partial indulgences this year, and are making plans to work on full indulgences next year, then we put our knowledge to work by praying in church for those we had lost this past year.


AND then heading out to the cemetery to pray for our loved ones and the souls in Purgatory.
