

MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

I recently read a conversation between Rod Dreher, who wrote the very influential book "The Benedict Option" from a Catholic/Orthodox perspective and Aaron Renn who wrote a similar book "Life in the Negative World" from an Evangelical Christian perspective. Both thinkers agree that the easy times for Christianity are over. Within living memory, Americans lived in a proudly Christian country. We were founded on Protestant principals, but eventually Catholics and Jews were brought into the tent and accepted as part of the culture. Attending church and living by the laws and morals of Christianity enhanced your social standing, but now if you take your faith seriously you may be branded as a "Christian Nationalist" or have FBI agents infiltrate your services. Christians who don't take God and His Commandments seriously and champion progressive secular causes are mostly left alone.

We have gone from living in Christendom to being strangers in our own land in about two generations. When you are a stranger in a strange land, you must be careful about what you say so you don't insult your hosts. It is a different world when you are no longer part of the majority culture. Renn explains: "Jews have to explain to their kids what Christmas is and why they don't celebrate it. And it doesn't have to be rooted in hostility. It's like, *Okay, we're in this Christmas-saturated culture. and that's not us.* And so I think we were going to have to do that. We're going to have to create our own sort of moral communities in which we uphold a different way of life, and a different standard for ourselves than the world...It's like, look, we don't smoke pot, we just don't do that. Right? We don't watch porn, we don't do that. We don't gamble on our phone, we don't do it. We just don't do that...We need to be need to build a moral community that is distinct." In other words, we need to become the "indigestible minority" in our new culture.

The survival of Christian faith in our country and in our families will require purposeful action on our part. Our children and grandchildren are no longer swimming in a clean, nutritious river. They are swimming in a sewer, and unless we intentionally build some type of shield around them, it will poison them. Unless you teach your children that they are Catholic and therefore we do certain things and we do not do other things, your grandchildren will never be baptized or raised in the faith. Start now to build up your family's faith-shield so they are indigestible by our toxic culture.

This month, lets pray for a revival of the Catholic, and even the other Christian denominations to resist the secular sewer. Following is the next selection on the Mass from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com.

God made us with a God-shaped hole in our heart so that
we will crave Him. Some try to fill this hole with worldly junk,
but that never works. Mass is not fun in a worldly way, but it
fills that hole in our heart and it is ultimately satisfying (Blaise Pascal, Pensees).

We go to The Mass to worship and give glory to God, not to be "entertained." It is not a "fellowship meal". Nor is it just about hearing a homily about how to be nice to each other and singing hymns. It is not about us and what we "get out of" Mass. Some experiences at the Mass are more inspirational than others. Those experiences are a gift but are not necessary. Even the dullest Mass with a terrible homily and off-key singing gives us powerful graces because heaven touches earth at every Mass. We need to try to develop a proper attitude of reverence for what actually happens at Mass.

MARCH—THE MONTH DEDICATED TO SAINT JOSEPH

"Glorious St. Joseph! Here, here is your place as "Protector of the Universal Church." ... Always be our protector. Let your inner spirit of peace, silence, work, and prayer in the service of the Holy Church always cheerfully enliven us, and we rejoice in union with your Holy Spouse, our sweet and Immaculate Mother, the most steadfast and gentle love of Jesus, the glorious and immortal King of ages and peoples. Amen!" ~Pope John XXIII



The month of March is dedicated to St. Joseph. As the head and protector of the Holy Family and a humble carpenter, St. Joseph is the perfect role model for men as a father, husband and worker. He is rightly venerated and loved for his deep faith and heroic virtues of pious humility and charity, perfect obedience and submission to the will of God and his chastity and holiness. As Patron of the Universal Church, he is also a role model for the interior life of priests and the religious.

All that we know about St. Joseph and his role in the Holy Family has been revealed through the Gospels. Though the Gospels are silent on the remainder part of St. Joseph's life, it is believed that he died peacefully in the loving arms of Jesus and Mary in Nazareth before Jesus began His ministry at the age of 30. Thus he became the patron of a happy death.

Devotion to Saint Joseph is evident in the early Church through the dedication of churches and a feast dedicated to the Saint, in the East, as early as the 4th century. However, the celebration of the Feast of St. Joseph on March 19th began sometime in the 15th century through the efforts of Saints Vincent Ferrer and Bernardine of Siena and the French theologians Pierre D'Ailly and Jean de Charlier de Gerson. It was declared as a day of obligation by Pope Gregory XV. On the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in 1889, the Pope spoke publicly about the devotion to Saint Joseph. In his Encyclical, Quamquam Pluries, Pope Leo XIII stated that it was of "high importance that the devotion to Saint Joseph should engraft itself upon the daily pious practices of Catholics" and that the faithful should be urged to it by "our words and authority". In 1870, on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Pope Pius IX declared Saint Joseph to be the Patron of the Universal Church, Later in 1909, on the vigil of the Feast, Pope Pius X approved the Litany of Saint Joseph for both private and public devotion throughout the Catholic world. In 1955, Pope Pius XII abolished the Feast of the Patronage of Saint Joseph and replaced it with the Feast of Saint Joseph the Worker which is celebrated on May 1 every year.

This month we are also in the Season of Lent — a time marked for deep reflection into our lives and amending our relationship with God. Our time on earth is all we have to decide on how we want to spend our eternal life. It is in the here and now that we need to make a choice about our eternal life.

This Lent, let us truly examine our hearts and make a sincere attempt to recollect all our sins, recognize our weaknesses that are the root causes of our sins and seek grace from God to overcome them. Conversion of heart is a work of grace of God who makes our hearts return to Him. We need His grace to humble ourselves, reflect on our past ways, recognize our sins and admit them with true remorse of having offended a loving Father. This Lent let us focus more on a conversion of heart and seek pardon and more grace through our penances rather than just engage in outward acts of penance without any remorse or change of heart.

In 1989 Pope John Paul II published his Apostolic Exhortation on the person and mission of Saint Joseph in the life of Christ and of the Church called Redemtoris Custos. His Holiness wrote that Our Lady and her Blessed Spouse are "the summit from which holiness spreads all over the earth" and that "what is crucially important here is the sanctification of daily life, a sanctification which each person must acquire according to his or her own state, and one which can be promoted according to a model accessible to all people."

Let us seek the intercession of Saint Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary to help us receive the grace to make this Lent more fruitful and amend our relationship with God so that we may be restored in holiness. Amen.






ARCHBISHOP'S ANNUAL APPEAL --- 2023-2024

A BABY'S HUG

We were the only family with children in the restaurant. I sat Erik in a high chair and noticed everyone was quietly seated and talking. Suddenly, Erik squealed with glee and said, "Hi there." He pounded his fat baby hands on the high chair tray. His eyes we crinkled in laughter and his mouth was bared in a toothless grin as he wriggled and giggled with merriment.

I looked around and saw the source of his merriment. It was a man whose pants were baggy whose toes poked out of would-be shoes. His shirt was dirty and his hair was uncombed and unwashed. His whiskers were too short to be called a beard, and his nose was so varicose that it looked like a road map.

We were too far from him to smell, but I was sure he smelled. His hands waved and flapped on loose wrists. "Hi there, baby; Hi there, big boy. I see ya, buster," the man said to Erik. My husband and I exchanged looks, "What do we do?" Erik continued to laugh and answer, "Hi, hi there." Everyone in the restaurant noticed and looked at us and then at the man. The old geezer was creating a nuisance with my beautiful baby.

Our meal came and the man began shouting from across the room, "Do ya patty cake? Do you know peek-a-boo? Hey, look, he knows peek-a-boo." Nobody thought the old man was cute. He was obviously drunk. My husband and I were embarrassed. We ate in silence but not Erik, who was running through his repertoire for the admiring skid row bum, who in turn, reciprocated with his cute comments.

We finally got through the meal and headed for the door. My husband went to pay the check and told me to meet him in the parking lot. The old man sat poised between me and the door. "Lord, just let me out of here before he speaks to me or Erik," I prayed. As I drew closer to the man, I turned my back, trying to sidestep him and avoid any air he might be breathing. As I did, Erik leaned over my arm, reaching with both arms in a baby's "pick-me-up" position. Before I could stop him, Erik had propelled himself from my arms to the man's. Suddenly, a very smelly old man and a baby expressed their love and kinship. Erik, in an act of total trust, love, and submission, laid his tiny head upon the man's ragged shoulder. The man's eyes closed, and I saw tears hover beneath his lashes. His aged hands full of grime, pain, and hard labor, cradled my baby. No two beings have ever loved so deeply for so short a time. I stood, awestruck. The old man rocked and cradled Erik in his arms and his eyes opened and set squarely on mine. He said in a firm commanding voice, "You take care of this baby." Somehow I managed, "I will," from a throat that contained a stone. He pried Erik from his chest lovingly, as though he were in pain.

I received my baby, and the man said, "God bless you, ma'am; you've given me the most wonderful gift." I said nothing more than a muttered thanks. With Erik in my arms, I ran for the car. My husband was wondering why I was crying and holding Erik so tightly and why I was saying, "My God, my God, forgive me." I had just witnessed Christ's love shown through the innocence of a tiny child who saw no sin, who made no judgment. The child saw a soul, and his mother saw a suit of clothes. I was a Christian who was blind holding a child who was not. I felt it was God asking, "Are you willing to share your son for a moment?" when He shared His for all eternity. The ragged old man, unwittingly, had reminded me,


THINGS AREN'T ALWAYS WHAT THEY SEEM







CURING THE MYSTERY FLU

You're driving home from work next Monday after a long day. You tune in your radio. You hear a blurb about a little village in India where some villagers have died suddenly, strangely, of a flu that has never been seen before. It's not influenza, but three or four people are dead, and it's kind of interesting, and they are sending some doctors over there to investigate it.

You don't think much about it, but coming home from church on Sunday you hear another radio spot. Only they say it's not three villagers, it's 30,000 villagers in the back hills of this particular area of India, and it's on TV that night. CNN runs a little blurb: people are heading there from the disease center in Atlanta because this disease strain has never been seen before.

By Monday morning when you get up, it's the lead story. It's not just India; it's Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran, and before you know it, you're hearing this story everywhere, and they have now coined it as "the mystery flu." The President has made some comment that he and his family are praying and hoping that all will go well over there. But everyone is wondering,

"How are we going to contain it?"

That's when the President of France makes an announcement that shocks Europe. He is closing their borders. No flights from India, Pakistan, or any of the countries where this thing has been seen. And that's why that night you are watching a little bit of CNN before going to bed. Your jaw hits your chest when a weeping woman is translated into English from a French news program. There's a man lying in a hospital in Paris, dying of the mystery flu. It has come to Europe.

Panic strikes.

As best they can tell, after contracting the disease, you have it for a week before you even know it. Then you have four days of unbelievable symptoms. And then you die. Britain closes it's borders, but it's too late. South Hampton, Liverpool, North Hampton, and it's Tuesday morning when the President of the United States makes the following announcement: "Due to a national-security risk, all flights to and from Europe and Asia have been canceled. If your loved ones are overseas, I'm sorry. They cannot come back until we find a cure for this thing."

Within four days our nation has been plunged into an unbelievable fear. People are People are wondering, "What if it comes to this country?" And preachers on Tuesday are saying it's the scourge of God. It's Wednesday night, and you are at a church prayer meeting when somebody runs in from the parking lot and yells, "Turn on a radio, turn on a radio." And while everyone in church listens to a little transistor radio with a microphone stuck up to it, the announcement is made. Two women are lying in a Long Island hospital, dying from the mystery flu. Within hours it seems, this disease envelops the country.

People are working around the clock, trying to find an antidote.

Nothing is working.

California, Oregon, Arizona, Florida, Massachusetts. It's as though it's just sweeping in from the borders.

And then all of a sudden the news comes out. The code has been broken. A cure can be found. A vaccine can be made. It's going to take the blood of somebody who hasn't been infected, and so, sure enough, all through the Midwest, through all those channels of emergency broadcasting, everyone is asked to do one simple thing: Go to your downtown hospital and have your blood analyzed. That's all we ask of you. When you hear the sirens go off in your neighborhood, please make your way quickly, quietly, and safely to the hospitals.

Sure enough, when you and your family get down there late on that Friday night, there is a long line, and they've got nurses and doctors coming out and pricking fingers and taking blood and putting labels on it. Your spouse and your kids are out there, and they take your blood and say, "Wait here in the parking lot, and if we call your name, you can be dismissed and go home." You stand around, scared, with your neighbors, wondering what on earth is going on, and if this is the end of the world.

Suddenly, a young man comes running out of the hospital screaming. He's yelling a name and waving a clipboard. What? He yells it again! And your son tugs on your jacket and says,

"Daddy, that's me."

Before you know it, they have grabbed your boy. "Wait a minute, hold on!" And they say, "It's okay, his blood is clean. His blood is pure. We want to make sure he doesn't have the disease. We think he has the right blood type."

Five tense minutes later, out come the doctors and nurses are crying and hugging one another — some are even laughing. It's the first time you have seen anybody laugh in a week, and an old doctor walks up to you and says, "Thank you, sir. Your son's blood is perfect. It's clean, it is pure, and we can make the vaccine."

As the word begins to spread all across that parking lot full of folks, people are screaming and praying and laughing and crying. But then the gray-haired doctor pulls you and your wife aside and says, "May we see you for a moment? We didn't realize that the donor would be a minor and we need... we need you to sign a consent form."

You begin to sign and then you see that the box for the number of pints of blood to be taken is empty. "H-h-h-how many pints?" And that is when the old doctor's smile fades, and he says, "We had no idea it would be a little child. We weren't prepared. We need it all!" "But... but... I don't understand. He's my only son!" "We are talking about the world here. Please sign. We... we... need to hurry!"

"But can't you give him a transfusion?" "If we had clean blood we would. Please, will you please sign?"

In numb silence you do. Then they say, "Would you like to have a moment with him before we begin?"

Could you walk back? Could you walk back to that room where he sits on a table saying, "Daddy? Mommy? What's going on?" Could you take his hands and say, "Son, your mommy and I love you, and we would never ever let anything happen to you that didn't just have to be! Do you understand that?" And when that old doctor comes back in and says, "I'm sorry, we've got to get started. People all over the world are dying," could you leave? Could you walk out while he is saying, "Dad? Mom? Dad? And then next week, when they have the ceremony to honor your son, and some folks sleep through it, and some folks don't even bother to come because they have better things to do, and some folks come with a pretentious smile and just pretend to care, would you want to jump up and say, "EXCUSE ME! MY SON DIED FOR YOU! DON'T YOU CARE? DOES IT MEAN NOTHING TO YOU?"

I wonder, is that what God wants to say? "MY SON DIED FOR YOU. DOES IT MEAN NOTHING? DON'T YOU KNOW HOW MUCH I CARE?"
