MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

We are in the middle of the third, mission year of our National Eucharistic Revival, so I wanted to revisit my thoughts from the Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis last summer.

Our little group was there, and it was awesome. It was life changing for all 60,000 of us. That first night when the pilgrims who had processed with the Eucharist, on foot from all 4 corners of the country, 2,200 miles for the California route, came into the football stadium there was a roar from the crowd, then the monstrance with Jesus came in, and the spotlight hit it, 60,000 people fell to their knees in that football stadium and you could hear a pin drop. Nobody told them to kneel. It was spontaneous. It is not easy to kneel in a crowded football stadium, but we did. I felt the earth shift a little on its axis that night. Maybe you felt it here too. Things are different now. Just like they were different after World Youth Day in Denver in '93 when so many young people found their faith and they went to seminaries, convents and started Catholic ministries. And many of them got married and raised large faithful Catholic families.

We had Mass and the rosary every morning and adoration with benediction every evening, and confession every day. I came across a line a block long in the convention center and I asked what was going on. They said it was the line for confession. There were dozens of priests on duty. Fr. Mike Schmitz spoke, he said that revival begins only after repentance. There was a lot of repentance, there were healings, physical, mental, and spiritual healings. There was praise and worship and adoration, and there were buckets of tears. The tears of joy that you get from Christ filling your heart.

What can we do to bring this revival home to our parishes? I suggest starting with focusing on who is in the Eucharist and focusing on being as reverent as we can be when receiving or being in the actual presence of Jesus. Pretend He is standing at the front of church in His robe and sandals. How would you respond then?

This month let's pray that Catholics and all others grow in their faith in the Eucharist. Following is the continuation of the chapter on Protestantism from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com.

Belief in scripture alone (Sola Scriptura), without the magisterium of the Church does not work. Christianity is a family. If one of our descendants found a trunk full of letters, emails, and Facebook postings written by our family, it would tell them a lot about us, but there are thousands of little things that happen in your family that never get written down. What color was your hair when you were born? What did you have for lunch last Easter? These things we know about our family that are not written down but are passed on at the dinner table are oral tradition. This is what Catholics believe is necessary along with Sacred Scripture to accurately guide the Church as Jesus intended.

Jesus said to Peter, "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16:19). All of the other



apostles looked up to Peter as their leader, and he made the final decision when there was disagreement. Acts 15:6-11 describes how Peter settled the issue of whether gentiles must be circumcised and become Jews before they could be Christian.

Historians don't know much about Valentine's early life. They pick up Valentine's story after he began working as a priest. Valentine became famous for marrying couples who were in love but couldn't get legally married in Rome during the reign of Emperor Claudius II, who outlawed weddings. Claudius wanted to recruit lots of men to be soldiers in his army and thought that marriage would be an obstacle to recruiting new soldiers. He also wanted to prevent his existing soldiers from getting married because he thought that marriage would distract them from their work.

When Emperor Claudius discovered that Valentine was performing weddings, he sent Valentine to jail. Valentine used his time in jail to continue to reach out to people with the love that he said Jesus Christ gave him for others.

He befriended his jailer, Asterious, who became so impressed with Valentine's wisdom that he asked Valentine to help his daughter, Julia, with her lessons. Julia was blind and needed someone to read material for her to learn it. Valentine became friends with Julia through his work with her when she came to visit him in jail.

Emperor Claudius also came to like Valentine. He offered to pardon Valentine and set him free if Valentine would renounce his Christian faith and agree to worship the Roman gods. Not only did Valentine refuse to leave his faith, he also encouraged Emperor Claudius to place his trust in Christ. Valentine's faithful choices cost him his life. Emperor Claudius was so enraged at Valentine's response that he sentenced Valentine to die.

The First Valentine

Before he was killed, Valentine wrote a last note to encourage Julia to stay close to Jesus and to thank her for being his friend. He signed the note: "From your Valentine." That note inspired people to begin writing their own loving messages to people on Valentine's Feast Day, February 14th, which is celebrated on the same day on which Valentine was martyred.

Valentine was beaten, stoned, and beheaded on February 14, 270. People who remembered his loving service to many young couples began celebrating his life, and he came to be regarded as a saint through whom God had worked to help people in miraculous ways. By 496, Pope Gelasius designated February 14th as Valentine's official feast day.

Famous Miracles of Saint Valentine

The most famous miracle attributed to Saint Valentine involved the farewell note that he sent to Julia. Believers say that God miraculously cured Julia of her blindness so that she could personally read Valentine's note, rather than just have someone else read it to her.

Throughout the years since Valentine died, people have prayed for him to intercede for them before God about their romantic lives. Numerous couples have reported experiencing miraculous improvements in their relationships with boyfriends, girlfriends, and spouses after praying for help from Saint Valentine.

JESUS'S SACRIFICE - THE GREATEST LOVE OF ALL

As the world adorns itself in hues of red and pink for Valentine's Day, preparing to celebrate the many expressions of love, let us turn our hearts to the profound and radical love that redefined humanity's history. This love, so pure and unfathomable, was demonstrated through Jesus Christ's selfless sacrifice on the cross, an act that continues to resonate through time.

In this season of affection and giving, may our hearts remember the love of Jesus that humbled itself to the point of death for the redemption of all. His unparalleled sacrifice exemplifies a love that is not self-seeking but is poured out generously for others.

Let this period be not only one of passing sentiments but also an opportunity for deep spiritual reflection. It is a time to contemplate what it truly means to love as Christ loved. By embracing the transforming power of this divine love, may we find ourselves moved to actions that reflect the depth and sincerity of our faith.

Let each day be an invitation to live out this calling of love, to embody the courage and passion that Jesus showed, and to illuminate the world with hope. As we interact with each other, may our actions and words be inspired by His example.

His Love

Jesus left Heaven to take on human flesh, consciously limiting Himself for us. He endured scorn, ridicule, betrayal, brutal torture, and execution on a cross. Though innocent of sin or any wrongdoing, He chose to give His life as an atoning sacrifice for sinners, bridging the separation between a God and sinful humanity.

Christ's unconditional love for us still shines as a beacon of hope and salvation. This divine love, etched into the history of mankind on the cross at Calvary, defies human understanding. Jesus, the embodiment of purity and sinlessness, embraced excruciating suffering and death, not as a martyr lacking choice, but as a redeemer paving the path to reconciliation. His crucifixion is the ultimate demonstration of love – an inclusive, unwavering, and transformative love.

Romans 5:8 proclaims this truth with piercing clarity, stating, "But God demonstrates his love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." The essence of this passage is profound; while we are flawed and undeserving, Christ's sacrificial love envelopes us. The gravity of our transgressions did not deter Him; instead, at the moment of our utmost need, Christ intervened with unmerited grace. As it says in Romans 5:6: "You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for us, the ungodly."

This profound and unbounded sacrificial love, illuminates the path toward personal and spiritual reconciliation. It is an invitation to each of us to undergo a transformation that mirrors Christ's unwavering love.

True Meaning of Love

How often do we confuse love with earthly things?

Jesus didn't come to earth to conquer. It wasn't about an army, a throne, or glory. It was about removing the barrier of sin that was keeping us from the Father and giving us an example of how we ought to treat each other.

"As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you," Jesus said in 1 John 15. "Now remain in my love. If you keep my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commands and remain in his love. ... My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you."

We did not deserve or initiate Jesus's costly display of love. God chose to demonstrate his love toward us in this manner. Love drove him to pay the ultimate price for our redemption.

The Ultimate Example

Jesus perfectly lived out the two greatest commandments: to wholeheartedly love God and to selflessly love others. After enjoying fellowship with our Heavenly Father, He stepped into this broken world on a rescue mission. Though rejected by the very ones He came to save – He forgave. Though facing injustice and cruelty– He endured. Though blameless – He took our sins upon Himself to reconcile us to God.

Christ set the ultimate example of love. As 1 John 3:16 states, "This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters." This may not mean giving up our lives, but it does mean sacrificing for the good of others. It means extending grace when wronged. It means offering forgiveness when it seems impossible. It means initiating love rather than just responding in kind.

In practical terms, this implies living with boundless generosity, not just from our surplus but with a readiness to share even from our scarcity. In this way, we not only show our commitment to the gospel and the teachings of Christ, but we also create ripples of love that can heal a fractured world.

Remember that love doesn't come with a schedule or time frame. "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth." (1 Corinthians 13:4-8)





PLENARY INDULGENCE INFORMATION:

A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic Church through the merits of Jesus Christ to remove the temporal punishment due to sin (i.e. Purgatory). The indulgence applies to sins already forgiven. A plenary indulgence completely cleanses the soul, as if the person had just been baptized. During the Jubilee Year two may be obtained per day. Only the first may be applied to oneself. If a second is obtained, it applies to souls in purgatory. Both may be applied to the deceased. 
