MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS



Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

In Matthew 16:13-20 we have very good evidence that Jesus intended to set up a church with a central leader (what we call a pope). Jesus spoke directly to Simon in the presence of the other disciples and made a series of truly remarkable statements about the role that Simon is to play in the Church. This passage is important to us because one of the biggest objections that most Protestants have to the Catholic church is the idea of a pope. They want to replace the pope with the bible alone. The problem is, that as necessary as the bible is to our faith, there are thousands of disagreements about how to understand the bible and that leads to thousands of Protestant denominations. As Catholics we trust the pope in union with his bishops to safeguard the faith and keep it free from error, including how to understand the bible. Notice the six ways in which Jesus presents Simon Peter to the other disciples, and to us.

- 1. Jesus describes Peter as a prophet. Verse 17: And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven.
- 2. Jesus then describes Peter as the chief patriarch and foundation stone of His new Church. Verse 18: And I tell you, you are Peter (translated as Rock), and on this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it. In the Old Testament when God gives someone a new name such as changing Abram's name to Abraham or changing Jacob's name to Israel, it is when they are about to do something big in salvation history. Peter is about the lead the new people of God.
- 3. At the time of Jesus every Jew knew that the Jewish temple had been built on a great natural stone slab, which they referred to as the "foundation stone". Tradition held that this stone blocked the path to the underworld: the gates of Hades. When Jesus speaks these words to Peter, He's identifying the Church as the New Covenant temple of God and saying that Peter is the "Rock" upon which this new temple will be built. He will serve as that foundation stone, holding the powers of hell at bay.
- 4. Jesus presents Peter as the royal steward of the Kingdom of God, the chief steward in God's house. Verse 19: I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. In ancient Israel, the chief steward of the king's household wore the keys to the palace tied to his shoulder. He was in charge. Anyone who wanted to see the king had to go through him. (Isiah 22:19-23) the keys and the authority rest with the chief steward who was like a prime minister in the kingdom of David.
- 5. Binding and loosing had another meaning as well in Jesus' day. It was used to speak of the authority of the rabbis to render official interpretations of the Jewish law. What Jesus is saying here is that Peter will function as chief rabbi in this new Israel. He will bind and loose and make decisions about theology and the governance of the church.
- 6. Jesus presents Peter as the chief forgiver of sins. While "binding and loosing" speaks of Peter's authority as teacher, later in Matthew and in John, Jesus uses this exact language to refer to the retaining and forgiving of sins.

Taken together, this is very good evidence that Jesus wanted Peter to be the leader of the church. It does not make sense that he would give us a leader for a few years, then after Peter dies, we are leaderless again. As Catholics, we must stay in union with the church, or we have nothing. This is true when we have good and wise popes, and true when we have bad popes. Once you separate yourself from him, you are on your own. Let us focus our prayers this month on church remaining unified and doing the Holy Spirit's will as the Synod on Synodality begins in Rome.

"THE GROWTH PATTERN OF SPIRITUALITY" by Rabbi Abraham Twerski

- Spiritual growth is somewhat similar to physical growth in that there are periods of rapid growth spurts and periods of apparent stagnation. There are periods of latency in spiritual growth just as in physical growth, where the groundwork is being laid for another rapid growth phase.
- Spiritual growth differs from physical growth in two ways: (1) It never comes to completion; and (2) there are periods when one feels he has regressed rather than progressed. The latter can be very frustrating and disappointing unless it is correctly understood. We have all had times when we feel we have prayed well with a great deal of concentration or studied a page of the Bible with a profound sensation of being in contact with the Divine wisdom. When we try to duplicate these feelings the next day, however, we find that they are not retrievable. (To be continued next month.)

SEPTEMBER—THE MONTH DEVOTED TO OUR LADY OF SORROWS

The Seven Sorrows of Mary are important for us to know and pray. They are all based on scripture and help us recall Mary's role in salvation history.

Though the practice of praying the Seven Sorrows of Mary dates back to the thirteenth century, there has been a resurgence of this devotion due to the apparition of Our Lady of Kibeho that took place in the 1980's in Rwanda. It was there that Our Lady urged people to pray the Seven Sorrows.

It is said that Mary revealed to St. Bridget of Sweden seven promises to those who will pray these sorrows. After reading the promises, you will surely want to implement this devotion in your own prayer life.

What are the Seven Sorrows of Mary?

1. The Prophecy of Simeon

And Simeon blessed them, and said to Mary his mother: Behold this child is set for the fall, and for the resurrection of many in Israel, and for a sign which shall be contradicted; And thy own soul a sword shall pierce, that, out of many hearts, thoughts may be revealed.—Luke 2:34-35

2. The Flight into Egypt

And after they were departed, behold an angel of the Lord appeared in sleep to Joseph, saying: Arise, and take the child and his mother, and fly into Egypt: and be there until I shall tell thee. For it will come to pass that Herod will seek the child to destroy him. Who arose, and took the child and his mother by night, and retired into Egypt: and he was there until the death of Herod: That it might be fulfilled which the Lord spoke by the prophet, saying: Out of Egypt have I called my son. Then Herod perceiving that he was deluded by the wise men, was exceeding angry; and sending killed all the men children that were in Bethlehem, and in all the borders thereof, from two years old and under, according to the time which he had diligently inquired of the wise men. Then was fulfilled that which was spoken by Jeremias the prophet, saying: A voice in Rama was heard, lamentation and great mourning; Rachel bewailing her children, and would not be comforted, because they are not. But when Herod was dead, behold an angel of the Lord appeared in sleep to Joseph in Egypt, Saying: Arise, and take the child and his mother, and go into the land of Israel. For they are dead that sought the life of the child. Who arose, and took the child and his mother, and came into the land of Israel.—Matthew 2:13-21

3. The Loss of Jesus for Three Days

And his parents went every year to Jerusalem, at the solemn day of the pasch, And when he was twelve years old, they going up into Jerusalem, according to the custom of the feast, And having fulfilled the days, when they returned, the child Jesus remained in Jerusalem; and his parents knew it not. And thinking that he was in the company, they came a day's journey, and sought him among their kinsfolks and acquaintance. And not finding him, they returned into Jerusalem, seeking him. And it came to pass, that, after three days, they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the doctors, hearing them, and asking them questions. And all that heard him were astonished at his wisdom and his answers. And seeing him, they wondered. And his mother said to him: Son, why hast thou done so to us? behold thy father and I have sought thee sorrowing. And he said to them: How is it that you sought me? did you not know, that I must be about my father's business? And they understood not the word that he spoke unto them.—Luke 2:41-50

4. The Carrying of the Cross

And bearing his own cross, he went forth to that place which is called Calvary, but in Hebrew Golgotha.— John 19:17

5. The Crucifixion of Jesus

Where they crucified him, and with him two others, one on each side, and Jesus in the midst. And Pilate wrote a title also, and he put it upon the cross. And the writing was: JESUS OF NAZARETH, THE KING OF THE JEWS. This title therefore many of the Jews did read: because the place where Jesus was crucified was night to the city: and it was written in Hebrew, in Greek, and in Latin. Then the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate: Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, I am the King of the Jews. Pilate answered: What I have written, I have written. The soldiers therefore, when they had

crucified him, took his garments, (and they made four parts, to every soldier a part,) and also his coat. Now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. They said then one to another: Let us not cut it, but let us cast lots for it, whose it shall be; that the scripture might be fulfilled, saying: They have parted my garments among them, and upon my vesture they have cast lots. And the soldiers indeed did these things. Now there stood by the cross of Jesus, his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalen. When Jesus therefore had seen his mother and the disciple standing whom he loved, he saith to his mother: Woman, behold thy son. After that, he saith to the disciple: Behold thy mother. And from that hour, the disciple took her to his own. Afterwards, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, said: I thirst. Now there was a vessel set there full of vinegar. And they, putting a sponge full of vinegar and hyssop, put it to his mouth. Jesus therefore, when he had taken the vinegar, said: It is consummated. And bowing his head, he gave up the ghost.——John 19:18-30

6. Jesus Taken Down from the Cross

And Nicodemus also came, (he who at the first came to Jesus by night,) bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. They took therefore the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths, with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury—John 19:39-40

7. Jesus Laid in the Tomb

And Nicodemus also came, (he who t the first came to Jesus by night,) bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. They took therefore the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths, with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury. Now there was in the place where he was crucified, a garden; and in the garden a new sepulchre, wherein no man yet had been laid. There, therefore, because of the parasceve of the Jews, they laid Jesus, because the sepulchre was night at hand.—John 19:39-42




