GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE—During my baseball career, my best coach often said, "You shouldn't be worried if I yell at you. Be worried if I don't. If I stop pushing you, it means I don't think you have any more potential." He demanded a lot, and I knew it meant he saw that I could be something special on the baseball field. Jesus says some demanding words to us this week. "Do you think I have come to establish peace on the earth?" he asks, "No, tell you, but rather division" (Luke 12:51). He wants you and me—in fact, all the earth—to participate in the luminous glory of God. That's why he speaks of himself as a divine arsonist. Divine fire is like a good coach: it demands the removal of all that obstructs the achievement of the lofty goal. How is your life demanding right now? That inconvenient family situation, the unfair boss at work, the kids who reject their parents' wishes, the nagging health issue? Maybe things would be more peaceful devoid of these

seemingly arbitrary difficulties. But for us who believe in the one who comes to set the earth of fire, we should be much more worried if he stops demanding so much from us. In fact, let's thank him for it. He sees how glorious we can become.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK . . .

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Catholic Parishes of Western Holt and Boyd Counties.

There's something in us that resists hearing messages of doom. There's no such thing as global warming, some say. The Holocaust is a hoax, some insist. If we accepted what those attune to Eather are telling us, it would demand that we make difficult changes in our patterns of consumption of the Earth's resources. If we learn how racism can lead to genocide, it would ask us to confront racist attitudes in ourselves and in our nation and would demand that we embrace new patterns of relating. But no one likes hearing prophets who speak the truth about dire consequences that will befall us unless we change.

One way to shut out the voice of an unwanted prophet is to do away with her or him. In this weekend's first reading (Jer 38:4-6, 8-10), the officials are able to convince the king that Jeremiah is not seeking the good of the people but its harm. He is "demoralizing the soldiers" and needlessly worrying the people with his warnings about the impending fall of Jerusalem. The officials are able to persuade King Zedekiah to give Jeremiah into their hands. They throw him into a cistern, where they leave him to die, until a eunuch in the king's house persuades the king to order his rescue.

We see a kind of tug of war in the first reading. Some heed the prophet's words and welcome his warming, while others resist the threat to their power, privilege and status that Jeramiah's message poses. Jesus speaks of the same king of divided reaction that his ministry provokes. As he ignites in his followers a vision of justice, peace and well-being, for all that could blaze forth, some readily welcome it. Others resist it mightily. The resisters are not eager for the burning away of their comforts and privileges as Jesus's way of transformation demands. The divisions over Jesus's message reach even into the inner recesses of the home, pitting family members against one another, as they struggle with what the gospel demands of them and how to heed it. Like King Zedekiah, who listens first to one set of officials and then to a servant with a different perspective. Christians are confronted with differing interpretations of what the gospel demands. It is easy to reject the version of the prophet that insists on transformative change. Better to get rid of such an unwelcome messenger and continue on undisturbed.

Jesus warns his followers not to be taken by surprise if his message provokes conflict and division. The way toward genuine peace is not a gentle, easy road. It is a path that entails struggle. Injustice does not die without heavy resistance. Those who embark on Jesus's way, however, are empowered by their baptism. Baptism brings about both refreshment and joy from being washed of sin, as well as an induction into a difficult, lifelong burning away of anything within that stands opposed to the gospel. Inflamed with the power of the **REQUESTS** Spirit, those baptized in Christ, are empowered to

continue his mission of healing divisions, as diverse hearts and minds are fused into one in the furnace of

Christ's love.
